## SOURCES OF GRANT AID

### INTRODUCTION

The Cheshire Clubs' Cricket Committee (CCCC) was formed by the Cheshire Cricket Board in 1997 to look after the development of senior recreational cricket in Cheshire. Since then, Cheshire cricket has become the envy of most other counties, whether it be in terms of administration, coaching, ground or pavilion improvements. The Cheshire league ladder structure also gives every club the chance to climb from the bottom to the top.

To assist the development of cricket in Cheshire, the CCCC has produced an updated edition of this booklet, *Sources of Grant Aid*, every two or three years. This booklet has proved conclusively that clubs of all sizes from towns and villages across the county structure have been able to secure funding; whether it be a few hundred pounds or thousands, grants have made a huge impact, helping to raise standards across Cheshire.

The introduction of ECB ClubMark accreditation a few years ago has helped to drive up standards in Cheshire cricket, by demonstrating a Club's commitment to having policies and procedures in place, particularly to safeguard young and vulnerable people. In fact, those clubs that choose not to seek accreditation will find it more and more difficult to source financial help as grant funders are increasingly viewing ECB ClubMark as a 'must have'.

Finally, the Cheshire Cricket Board and the CCCC are keen to see the present number of ECB Focus Clubs in Cheshire increase so that they can apply for ECB funding and other grants to enable them to develop their facilities and take part in the delivery of the Board's strategic Development Plan. To improve future editions of this booklet, please feel free to notify the CCCC or the Cheshire Cricket Development Office of additions or amendments that could be included.

## HOW THIS BOOKLET CAN HELP

Securing funding, from whatever source, takes time and effort. As applying for funding is very competitive and professional in its approach, any application must try to 'stand out from the crowd'. This booklet summarises sources of grant aid, outlining the broad parameters of each scheme to give you a flavour of the scope and eligibility criteria. Although the list is not exhaustive, the sources represent those most likely to bring success. There is also general advice on preparing a strong funding application. Contact details for further information and applications forms are given, together with a list of recent successful applicants (where known).

When seeking a suitable grant, don't just look for those funders who will fund 'cricket' (as these are few and far between). Your approach should be to look at the criteria of each funder and tailor your application accordingly. For instance, some funders want to help particular groups of people (e.g. young people, those living in rural communities, people with a disability) or support projects which generate particular outcomes (eg. improving levels of physical activity, improving confidence). The vehicle through which both of these criteria could be addressed is cricket (or any other sport for that matter).

Self-help also plays a key role in successful applications. For most funding sources, you will be asked to contribute something, whether it be cash or 'in kind' (e.g. volunteer labour). As your chances of success improve with the more you can contribute, this is where your own club fundraising becomes vital. If seeking sponsorship or donations, do not underestimate the value of personal contacts within your Club - this is your most important source.

When looking for funding, for example, for equipment, facilities, coaches or activities, consider if your cricketing neighbours and/or local community groups could benefit as well. This is because there are simply not enough funds available to provide for the needs and wants of every club in Cheshire. Funders look favourably upon organisations working with others, from a value for money point of view.

Most grant-makers like to fund people and activities, rather than large building projects. If you are trying to fund costly building works, it is likely the funds will need to be raised from a mix of your own fundraising activity and grants. Also remember to pay attention to ongoing maintenance and replacement costs. With time, even the newest pavilion has to be repainted and equipment serviced.

Finally, when applying for grant aid, it is strongly recommended that you contact the Cheshire Cricket Development Office at the outset. Also, while some grant funding sources in this booklet refer to Cheshire, please bear in mind they may not include other local authority areas covered by the Cheshire cricket structure, such as Trafford, Tameside or Wirral; in such cases, there should be equivalents.

## **PREPARING A STRONG FUNDING APPLICATION – HINTS AND TIPS**

- Discuss your plans at the outset with your Club Development Manager and the respective funding body to determine their initial interest in your project.
- Establish a need for funding by consulting children, parents and/or the local community. This will help establish interest and show how many will benefit.
- Make sure your plans are thorough, have been accurately costed and have an identified timescale. Assume the reader knows nothing about your organisation – when answering questions, be clear, specific and concise.
- Your application must meet the criteria of the respective funding body.
- Your application should request only the funds you require and demonstrate value for money. Include details of other confirmed funding, and where not confirmed, when you expect to receive a decision.
- Contributing cash or 'in kind' resources (eg. labour, product), will increase your chances of success. Never ask for 100% funding, always contribute something.
- Your application should outline how your plans benefit the wider community (eg. young people, women, people with disabilities, ethnic minority groups etc).
- Where relevant, demonstrate how your plans have strategic relevance (eg. to County, Regional and/or National Cricket Development Plans).
- Ensure the timescale of your plan / project is in line with that of the funding body.
- Where necessary, ensure you have the relevant planning permission or written confirmation if it is not required.
- Ensure equipment purchase or facilities meet with required design and / or performance criteria. (Contact your Club Development Manager for details).
- To assist with monitoring your project and evaluating progress, keep receipts, record the number of participants and any comments made by beneficiaries, for example.

## **OTHER CONSIDERATIONS**

- Do not start a project before you receive official written notice of an award or permission to go ahead. Funding bodies will not fund retrospectively.
- Consider every possible funding option available (eg. grants, sponsorship, donations and your own fundraising activities). Be willing to give the funding body(s) full recognition for any support and think how you could publicise your success.
- If successful, say 'Thank you'; it's the start of a relationship, not the end.

## **ECB GRANT AID PROGRAMME**

The ECB has been awarded substantial funding by Sport England to invest in capital projects and facilities. The ECB GRANT AID PROGRAMME (EGAP) represents an excellent opportunity for the ECB to direct investment into key clubs on a strategic basis in order to improve the facilities at clubs. This will be the major funding source for cricket clubs.

Over 40 Cheshire clubs have benefited from substantial investment through this programme over the past 8 years. Unfortunately, funding is less plentiful than previously but there are still opportunities for 1 or 2 clubs to benefit annually.

## **ECB SMALL GRANT SCHEME**

The England and Wales Cricket Trust Limited (EWCT) Small Grant Scheme aims to help Clubs make small, incremental changes to improve the quality and sustainability of cricket provision that directly impacts on the playing of the game of cricket, and / or reduces the operating costs of cricket clubs by the purchase of materials. An amount is allocated to the Cheshire Cricket Board each year, though the amount varies annually.

### **PRINCIPAL CRITERIA**

- Any affiliated Cricket Club with a Junior Section that has ECB ClubMark Accreditation or, as a minimum, is registered and actively working towards Accreditation.
- Clubs who received an award from the Small Grant Scheme are not eligible to reapply the following year

### **OTHER CONSIDERATIONS**

- Priorities for funding may vary from year to year. For example, priorities in 2013 relate to the theme of sustainability, and could include items such as double glazing and/or insulation; installation of a more energy efficient boiler; rainwater harvesting and reuse; water mopping equipment; covers and extended sheeting
- The fund is restricted to a maximum of 50% of total cost, so a club will need to show how the balance has been raised, for example, from club funds, other grant sources or an ECB Interest Free Loan.
- A Prioritisation Panel will decide which applications are to be supported as the scheme is likely to be oversubscribed.

## ENGLAND AND WALES CRICKET TRUST

The Trust is a wholly owned charitable subsidiary of the ECB. It has an interest-free loan scheme which aims to finance capital projects, including renovations, to improve facilities which contribute to increased participation in cricket. The maximum interest-free loan is £50,000. Most loans will be for less than 5 years, though the maximum loan period is 10 years.

### PRINCIPAL CRITERIA

The criteria for applying through the Cheshire Cricket Development Office is that Clubs must have achieved Cheshire Cricket Board Focus Club status, including:

- affiliation to the ECB through the Cheshire Cricket Board.
- achieved ECB ClubMark Accreditation (maintain and re-accredit every 3 years).
- clubs must have a junior section, defined as a cricket club that offers appropriate coaching and competition to cricketers under the age of 18 years old
- regular attendance at Development Groups.
- membership of the Cheshire Association of Groundsmen.
- annual participation in NatWest Cricketforce.
- annual uploading of club details on ECB Club Development Planning System.
- willingness to host Cheshire junior and senior representative games and training sessions.
- eligible clubs may only submit an application after the approval of an ECB Regional Funding and Facilities Manager

### OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- there are a number of mandatory requirements a club must meet in order to apply, for example, relating to tenure, insurance, club finances, child welfare and an equity policy.
- the types of projects considered include synthetic net bays, fine turf square and outfield, drainage, machinery, scoreboards, sightscreens (the list is not exhaustive).
- ineligible projects include general landscaping, car parks, outdoor lighting, CCTV, coaching items, bowling machines, video recorders (the list is not exhaustive).

### DEADLINES

An application can be made at any time but in conjunction with the Cheshire Cricket Development Office.

## **ECB 'CLUBMARK' ACCREDITATION**

'ClubMark' is an accreditation which demonstrates that a club is a 'safe, effective and child friendly club'. The criteria have been revised from January 2007. The CCCC will give a grant of £50 to cover expenses incurred to those clubs that successfully achieve ClubMark. The process involves providing evidence to an assessor that a club meets key requirements in specific areas, for instance:

1. Safeguarding of children
2. The cricket programme
3. Equity
4. Management

### **OTHER CONSIDERATIONS**

ClubMark is more than a 'box ticking' exercise; it is a major statement by a club which says that it has a culture which ensures an ongoing commitment to ClubMark and that all members of the club have signed up to the principles outlined in the programme. It also states that the club has adopted the ECB child welfare policy – "Safe Hands" (Cricket's Policy for Safeguarding Children) – and the ECB's Inclusion and Diversity Policy. Confirmation of their adoption should be in the Club's Constitution.

Clubs that choose not to seek the ClubMark accreditation will find it more and more difficult to source financial help. Funders will increasingly use ClubMark as a 'must have' before considering requests for assistance. Furthermore, funding will be channelled towards 'Focus Clubs'.

All Clubs due to renew accreditation, or apply for accreditation for the first time, will receive a CD ROM with templates of the new forms and detailed information on the criteria. Clubs will be required to self audit on an annual basis.

## LOCAL AUTHORITIES

Local Authorities often have their own grant schemes to help community and voluntary organisations (including sports clubs) in their locality. The size and range of schemes will vary from year to year and from authority to authority. Local authorities may also have their own Community Sports Networks, a network of local sports clubs who benefit from sharing information on all aspects of developing and running a club. The Networks may also be supported by the local County Sports Partnership.

## TOWN AND PARISH COUNCILS

Small grants are often available from Town and Parish Councils for projects in the local community. The ability to provide financial support varies from Council to Council, though is often used as a source of matched funding towards a project. The ideal time to approach a Council for funding is towards the end of a financial year and the beginning of a new one.

## **BIG LOTTERY FUND 'AWARDS FOR ALL' (A4A)**

The National Lottery small grants scheme, Awards for All, changed on 1 April 2009. Previously supported by the four Lottery Distributors – the Arts Council England, the Big Lottery Fund, the Heritage Lottery Fund and Sport England – each Distributor now operates their own separate small grant scheme. The 'brand' of Awards for All has been retained by the Big Lottery Fund, and is summarised here; Sport England's scheme is outlined later.

**Do I apply to the Big Lottery Fund or Sport England?** If the aim of your project, for example, is to accommodate a demand by local community groups to use your pavilion or clubhouse to run their activities, then the Big Lottery Fund's scheme is the way to go. However, if the aim of your project, for example, is to deliver a youth development and coaching programme which requires coaches and equipment for your junior section, then Sport England's small grant scheme is the way to go. Both schemes award grants of between £300 and £10,000. A4A allow an organisation to apply for up to £10,000 per year, though for different projects. If in doubt, contact both Funders to clarify your best approach.

**PRINCIPAL CRITERIA** Projects must meet one or more of the following outcomes:

- People have better chances in life - with better access to training and development to improve their life skills.
- Stronger communities - with more active citizens working together to tackle their problems.
- Improved rural and urban environments - which communities are better able to access and enjoy.
- Healthier and more active people and communities.

**OTHER CONSIDERATIONS** You can apply for a grant if you:

- are a not-for-profit group
- have a bank account that requires at least two unrelated people to sign each cheque or withdrawal
- have a governing body with at least three unrelated members
- can spend the grant within one year

A grant can be used for:

- putting on an event or activity, including venue hire
- training
- publicity materials for use in your project
- sessional workers (those who work only as and when required)
- equipment hire or purchase (including information technology equipment)
- updating equipment for health and safety reasons
- volunteers' expenses
- building, refurbishment or property projects costing £25,000 or less (including VAT)

### **DEADLINES FOR APPLICATIONS**

- applications can be made at any time, though should be submitted at least 3 months before you want your project to start. Forms can be emailed; you will receive an 'in principle' decision within 6 weeks, and a final decision within 12 weeks.

## **SPORT ENGLAND – SMALL GRANT PROGRAMME**

The National Lottery small grants scheme, Awards for All, changed on 1 April 2009. Previously supported by the four Lottery Distributors – the Arts Council England, the Big Lottery Fund, the Heritage Lottery Fund and Sport England – each Distributor now operates their own separate small grant scheme.

The Sport England Small Grants Programme uses Lottery funding to make awards of between £300 and £10,000 to not-for-profit organisations to help more young people (aged 14+) and adults take and keep a sporting habit for life. Sport England's strategy for 2012-17 is focused on people aged 14+ playing regular sport, and on developing opportunities for those that want to progress in their chosen sport. Sport England also want to further develop opportunities for disabled people playing more sport. Small Grants will not fund projects that do not impact on this strategy.

(Sport England also administer a series of themed funding programmes offering larger grants – please refer to page 11 for an overview).

### **PRINCIPAL CRITERIA**

- The total project cost should not exceed £50,000
- Projects must be deliverable within 12 months and provide a monitoring report within 13 months of the date of the offer letter
- Projects must seek to increase participation in sport, sustain participation in sport or provide opportunities to excel at a chosen sport
- Sporting outcomes must be the main focus of the project. Projects using sport as a means to an end are acceptable, but there must be a clear sporting benefit

### **OTHER CONSIDERATIONS**

- Complete the pre-application checklist to determine if your organisation and project is eligible to apply
- Your project must meet the aims of the Small Grants Programme, have clear aims and objectives, and stand a good chance of achieving those aims
- Your application must present clear evidence of the need for the project
- The maximum grant allowed is £10,000 in a 12 month period
- Your project start date must be at least 10 weeks after submission of your complete application and supporting documents.
- Your project must be for new activity and new costs delivering new sporting benefit.
- Refer to the Programme guidance for clarification on what will not be funded.
- Cricket clubs have been successful in securing funding, for example, for practice nets, covers, mowers and ancilliary equipment, rollers, coaching and development costs, girls / women's community coaching, bowling machines, and coach education courses

### **DEADLINES FOR APPLICATIONS**

Applications can be made at any time, though must be submitted online via their website. Applicants will have the opportunity to upload any supporting documentation at the end of the online application process. It could take up to 12 weeks to receive a decision (subject to the receipt of all requested documentation).

## **SPORT ENGLAND – THEMED FUNDING PROGRAMMES**

Sport England is focused on helping people and communities across the country create a sporting habit for life. Sport England will be investing over £1 billion of National Lottery and Exchequer funding between 2012 and 2017 in organisations and projects that will create more opportunities for young people to play sport, nurture and develop talent, provide the right facilities in the right places and ensure real opportunities for communities.

There are a few cricket clubs across the country that have been successful in securing grant funding from two themed funding programmes, namely, Inspired Facilities and Protecting Playing Fields. A brief overview of each programme is below though reference must be made to the specific guidance for each programme, for example, regarding eligibility, deadlines, partnership funding requirements, type of project, project outcomes, and so on. Each themed funding programme will have its own funding rounds over the next few years, each with different deadlines.

**Inspired Facilities** (grants up to £50,000; more in exceptional circumstances)

Inspired Facilities is focused on making it easier for local community and volunteer groups to improve and refurbish sports clubs or transform non-sporting venues into modern grassroots sport facilities. Projects will range from building modernisations and extensions, sports equipment, sports lighting through to sustainability improvements to reduce carbon footprints and reduce running costs.

**Protecting Playing Fields** (grants up to £50,000)

The programme will identify and fund projects that help communities realise the sporting benefits of playing field land. The programme will fund capital projects that create, develop and improve playing fields for sporting and community use and offer long term protection of the site for sport. Projects are likely to involve the construction of new natural turf pitches or improvement of existing ones that need leveling or drainage works.

## SPORT ENGLAND – SPORTSMATCH

Sportsmatch can fund formally constituted not-for-profit organisations and statutory bodies. This might include sports clubs, voluntary organisations, local authorities, schools, universities or governing bodies of sport. Sportsmatch makes awards to organisations that have secured sponsorship to deliver new community projects for young people (aged 14+) and adults to take up and keep a sporting habit for life. Sportsmatch uses money from the government to encourage new sponsorship of grassroots community sport. Priority is given to applications seeking to match sponsorship, pound-for-pound, from the commercial sector but donations from private individuals or charitable trusts are also acceptable provided they meet the sponsorship eligibility criteria. Awards of between £1,000 and £100,000 can be made to match funding from no more than five sponsors, with each sponsor contributing a minimum of £1,000 (except for schools where the minimum is £500).

**STOP PRESS:** At the time of this booklet publication, Sport England is reviewing Sportsmatch. Whilst they are committed to its continuation, a further announcement on the future shape of Sportsmatch will be made at the completion of the review, which is likely to be in the early summer 2013. The information here relates to the current situation.

### PRINCIPAL CRITERIA

- sponsorship can be matched which has been given by an eligible company, a charitable trust/charity with grant giving powers, or a private individual.
- sponsorship contributions can be either cash or in-kind, but in-kind sponsorship cannot consist of more than 50% of your total sponsorship amount.
- to be eligible, a sponsor must be: a first time sponsor of grassroots sport; an existing sponsor investing additional money; a new sponsor to that organisation (or have not sponsored the organisation in the past 3 years).

### OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- you can have already received the money from your sponsor at the time of submitting your application. However, you should not spend any of your sponsor's money on the project until you have received a funding decision.
- sponsorship in-kind relates to where the sponsor provides equipment or items to the organisation, instead of investing cash. Sportsmatch may be able to match the value of these items provided it equates to no more than 50% of the total eligible sponsorship.
- the majority of commercial companies and charitable trusts will be eligible to act as a sponsor, though there are a few exceptions (refer to the guidance notes).
- refer to the 'What makes a good application' section on their website.
- once your application is received, it should take no longer than twelve weeks to receive a decision (subject to the receipt of all requested documentation).

### DEADLINE FOR APPLICATIONS

In recent years, Sportsmatch have received more applications than they can support, and have closed the application process before the end of a financial year. Their website provides up to date information on funding rounds and deadlines. Applications must be submitted online via their website.

## **SPORT ENGLAND – SPORTIVATE**

Sportivate is a nationwide campaign that aims to capture the excitement of sport by providing opportunities for teenagers and young people to participate in high quality weekly coached sports programmes. Sportivate is part of 'Places People Play', Sport England's London 2012 mass participation legacy programme. Sportivate began in July 2011 and will run until March 2015.

County Sports Partnership will lead on this programme, for example, Sport Cheshire, Greater Sport (Manchester) and the Merseyside Sports Partnership. Relevant clubs, groups and organisations who feel they can contribute suitable activities and programmes can apply for Sportivate funding.

### **PRINCIPAL CRITERIA**

Each County Sports Partnership will have similar criteria and priorities. For example, Sport Cheshire's priorities for 2013/14 are:

- Targeted young people must be aged 14 to 25 years with a particular focus on 16 to 25
- Planned activity must be targeted with evidence/research to justify the need and demand for participation
- All activities must be a minimum block of 6 sessions and each session last a minimum of 1 hour
- Activity must lead to an exit route / sustainable session (eg. a local sports club)

### **ELIGIBLE COSTS**

- Paying coaches to run activities
- Volunteers (in kind) to help run activities
- Hire of facilities to deliver activities
- Transport to aid young people and coaches to attend sessions
- Marketing / publicity
- Training/coaching courses

## LANDFILL COMMUNITIES FUND

Almost all landfill operations have to pay a 'landfill tax' for dumping waste in registered landfill sites. Part of this tax can be redistributed by the landfill site operator to local community projects. Such projects must generate environmental improvements.

### PRINCIPAL CRITERIA

- projects must be within ten miles of a registered landfill site.
- a cash contribution of approx 10% is required.

### EXAMPLE

FCC Environment (formerly Waste Recycling Group) is one of the largest landfill operators in Cheshire. Waste Recycling Environmental Ltd (WREN) is the Body that administers and distributes landfill tax credits generated by FCC. FCC operates four landfill sites in Cheshire (near Chester, Crewe, Macclesfield and Warrington). Other landfill operators with a presence in Cheshire that take part in the fund include Biffa Award and Veolia, for example.

### OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- for WREN, a cricket / sport club will not be eligible unless there is considerable community benefit. For example, a cricket club could apply for funding to improve the pavilion / clubhouse if the building is used in a similar way to a village hall or community centre. The building must be used regularly by at least 4 different community groups (eg. whist drive, pre-school, exercise class, adult learning courses).
- for WREN, applications to improve facilities for single-sport clubs, such as artificial wickets, practice nets or drainage, are not eligible for funding because there is limited community benefit. (For other Fund operators, check their criteria).
- for WREN, they no longer accept applications for funding to construct new buildings or extensions to existing buildings; in practice, this means the bricks and mortar, including the roof. However, WREN will still consider funding applications for internal finishes, fixtures and fittings (eg. windows, doors, heating, toilets, kitchen) within a newly built facility and will continue to fund the refurbishment of existing buildings.
- project ideas should be discussed with the relevant operator at the outset to check eligibility. Some operators have a postcode search facility on their website to also assist with identifying eligible locations. Grant size will also vary between operators.

### DEADLINES FOR APPLICATIONS

Applications can be made at any time, though the process and forms will vary from operator to operator. Most have quarterly deadlines publicised on their respective websites.

## **DISCRETIONARY RATE RELIEF**

Under the Local Government Finance Act 1988, Local Authorities are allowed to grant Discretionary Rate Relief (DRR) to all voluntary non-profit making organisations, up to 100%. Each Council has different conditions and criteria with regard to the level of DRR. It is important to maximise any DRR as this is an annual benefit to the finances of a club.

### **EXAMPLES OF CRITERIA (list is not exhaustive and subject to local variations)**

- the rateable value is less than £4,500
- the annual turnover in the latest set of accounts is less than £25,000
- the membership is open to all sections of the community
- 50% or more of the membership live in the respective local authority area
- clubs have a junior section

### **OTHER CONSIDERATIONS**

- any club registered as a Charitable Organisation is eligible for 80% relief, mandatory under the Finance Act 1988. This could include being a Community Amateur Sports Club (CASC).
- Rateable Values (compiled by the Inland Revenue) are normally revised every five years. Any club that is subjected to a major increase should contact their Local Authority.

### **DEADLINES FOR APPLICATIONS**

As per each individual local authority, though usually towards the beginning of a new financial year

## **NATIONAL GOVERNING BODIES OF SPORT**

For those cricket clubs situated on multi-use sites, working alongside other sports such as tennis or football, for example, then consider approaching their respective National Governing Body. There may be scope to lever funding where there is joint use of facilities, such as changing rooms or pitches, where more than one sport will benefit.

## COMMUNITY AMATEUR SPORTS CLUBS – TAX RELIEF

With the granting of the Royal Assent to the 2002 Finance Bill on 24<sup>th</sup> July 2002, Community Amateur Sports Clubs (CASCs) may register with the Inland Revenue to claim tax relief. However, CASCs are not treated as charities for tax purposes, but some of the reliefs are similar. Up until 1 April 2009, HMRC could recognise a club as both a charity and a CASC but after this date, a registered CASC cannot be accepted as a charity for tax purposes.

### BENEFITS TO A COMMUNITY AMATEUR SPORTS CLUB

This measure helps those clubs which do not wish to obtain full charitable status by giving them many of the benefits enjoyed by charities, for instance:

- Fundraising income up to £30,000 exempt from tax
- Income from interest exempt from tax
- Rental income up to £20,000 exempt from tax
- Disposals assets exempt from capital gains tax
- Gift Aid on individual donations (though not for membership subscriptions)
- Inheritance tax relief on gifts
- Gifts of assets on no-gain, no-loss basis for capital gains

Note: Bear in mind that tax relief initiatives are subject to periodic change, so always check the latest guidance using the contact details outlined below. For example, the Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme is due to come into effect on 6<sup>th</sup> April 2013. The scheme has been designed for charities and CASCs to receive a top-up payment on small cash donations of up to £20 where a Gift Aid declaration is difficult to obtain. Top-up payments can be received on up to £5,000 of small donations per year.

### CRITERIA FOR TAX RELIEF

The tax relief package will be available to CASCs that:

- Are open to the whole community (though classes of membership are permitted)
- Are organised on an amateur basis
- Have as their main purpose providing facilities for and promoting participation in one or more of the eligible sports (such as cricket)

Note: There is no provision in the legislation for a club to de-register; once a CASC, always a CASC.

## CHARITABLE TRUSTS AND FOUNDATIONS – AN OVERVIEW

Trusts and Foundations are charities that exist to give money to other charities, community and voluntary groups. Some Trusts are very small, able only to award a few hundred pounds each year, whereas large ones are able to award thousands. The majority of Trusts will not fund sport directly, choosing to focus on young people, social welfare aspects, for example. Most Trusts have specific grant making policies.

**PRINCIPAL CRITERIA** Most Trusts will state:

- what kind of activities they support (e.g. young people, social welfare, disabled people)
- where they will support (e.g. Cheshire only, North West, country-wide)
- what type of grant they will award (e.g. capital and/or revenue)
- minimum and maximum levels of grant
- what they will not support (eg. repair, maintenance or running costs).

### OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- target local trusts first as they have geographic limitations that could be to your benefit
- some Trusts will discuss a proposal prior to submitting an application (some won't).
- a written application need be no more than two sides of A4 (unless stated otherwise)
- ask for funding for a particular project, rather than your whole organisation
- write an application tailored to the needs of the Trust you are approaching
- if successful, keep the Trust informed of your progress

## THE LORD'S TAVERNERS FOUNDATION

The Lord's Taverners are officially accredited by the ECB as the national charity for the game. They aim to give young people, particularly those with special needs, an opportunity to participate in recreational cricket.

**Note: April 2013: We are advised that the Lord's Taverners funding for Non Turf Pitches/Netting as detailed below has now been oversubscribed for 2013, and will hopefully reopen in 2014.**

### **PRINCIPAL CRITERIA    Non Turf Pitches (NTP)**

- awards are available up to a maximum of £3,000 for a Non-Turf Pitch; £2,000 for Non-Turf practice ends and £1,000 for outdoor nets
- applications will be considered from ECB affiliated Clubs, individual schools or other organisations directly involved in the development of youth cricket and which have a genuine need for assistance
- a copy of the quotation for the project must be submitted at the time of the application
- applicants must await formal written approval from The Lord's Taverners prior to the work being undertaken
- all projects must be completed within 9 months of receiving formal written approval
- applicants must only use the ECB Approved Non-Turf Pitch System Suppliers for projects involving Non-Turf Pitches / Batting Ends. This does not apply to Nets / Netting Systems
- successful applicants are not eligible to re-apply for funding within two years of receiving an award
- all applications must be made on the official application form and approved in writing by the appropriate County Board Cricket Development Manager

### **PRINCIPAL CRITERIA    Cricket Equipment Scheme**

An application can be made for one of the following cricket bags:

- Youth Hard Ball (Under 16s); Colts Hard Ball (Under 13s); Junior Hard Ball (Under 11s); Girls Hard Ball (age 15 – 18 years) – all £40; Soft Ball Cricket (6 – 11 years) - complimentary

Applications should be sent to the County Cricket Development Officer.

## **MANCHESTER AIRPORT COMMUNITY TRUST FUND**

The Manchester Airport Community Trust Fund has been established by Manchester Airport plc in order to promote, enhance, improve and protect both the natural and built environment in areas affected by Manchester Airport. The Airport contributes between £100,000 and £150,000 each year to the Fund. It also donates the money it receives from airlines who exceed the noise limits when flying out of the airport.

The Trust award grants to support eligible charitable projects that have a community, social or environmental focus. Projects must be within the specified area affected by aircraft operations; a map within the application guidance defines the boundary. Parts of the Boroughs of Stockport, Trafford, Manchester, Tameside, Cheshire West & Chester and Cheshire East are eligible.

### **PRINCIPAL CRITERIA**

Your project must:

- improve or protect the natural, social and/or built environment
- be within the specified area most affected by aircraft operations
- offer open access and demonstrate lasting benefit to the wider community

### **OTHER CONSIDERATIONS**

- the maximum grant is £3,000 (average grant is around £2,000) and an organisation must not have received funding in the last 3 years
- consider applications for particular items or works that allow your project to increase community benefit
- Trustees prefer to offer part funding to complement your fundraising or grant raising
- Trustees prefer to support groups that have volunteer involvement
- Projects must be for the benefit of the whole community, or a substantial section of it, and not groups of an exclusive nature. Membership groups, clubs, societies and sport clubs will be considered on their own merits, particularly looking at community access and membership fees.
- running costs, salaries, expenses, general repairs and maintenance, the purchase of land or buildings, and an individual's sports kit will not be funded

### **DEADLINE FOR APPLICATIONS**

Trustees meet quarterly to consider grants in January, April, July and October. Applications should be received no later than the first Friday of the month preceding the meeting.

## **WOMEN'S SPORT TRUST**

Women's Sport Trust, set up in 2013, aims to encourage greater engagement with women's sport through participation. The Trust provide scholarships/grants to aspiring sportswomen, fund research and public awareness campaigns, and support anything else that will enable the progression of women's sport in the UK.

The size of grants available depends entirely on the amount donated the previous year. In 2013, there are four tiers of grants available at £500, £1,000, £2,000 and £5,000 which will be awarded on a discretionary basis. The Trust will consider a wide variety of funding requests from all individuals whether they are mainstream or minority sports.

### **PRINCIPAL CRITERIA**

- As long as you can demonstrate a need for funding, provide a detailed plan of how the money would be spent, and you can indicate how the grant will have a positive impact, you are eligible to apply.
- No preference is given to types of sport or sport-related activity.

### **OTHER CONSIDERATIONS**

Grants are available to support anything to do with women's sport, for example:

- Kit for a women's sports club
- Training to become a sports coach
- Childcare provision
- Sports research grant
- Travel expenses to get to training or competition

### **DEADLINES FOR APPLICATIONS**

The Trust accepts grant applications on an ongoing basis. Applications are long-listed quarterly, and feedback is given to applicants. Applications are short-listed in the autumn and candidates are then voted on by the Trust's Women's Sport Trust champions. Winning individuals will be informed in November each year.

## CHESHIRE COMMUNITY FOUNDATION

Cheshire Community Foundation supports a wide range of charitable activity aimed at improving the quality of life for local people in Cheshire East, Cheshire West and Chester and Warrington. There are other Community Foundations for Merseyside, Greater Manchester, Derbyshire, Shropshire and Staffordshire organisations, each giving grants in a similar way to the Cheshire Community Foundation, though they may have different criteria and priorities. Therefore, research the Foundation relevant to your geographic location to determine your eligibility to apply. The following information relates to the Cheshire Community Foundation.

### PRINCIPAL CRITERIA

- The Cheshire Community Foundation mainly gives grants to organisations that are 'not for profit' such as charities, community groups and social enterprises.
- Important: Applications involving sport will be considered on a 'case by case' basis. The Foundation welcomes applications for projects that intend to use sport as a tool to tackle a social issue or bring a community together, but is reluctant to fund sport for sport's sake, as there are other sources of funding for sport.

### OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- The Foundation encourages grant applicants to talk to them before filling out an application form, as this can save you time if your project is not one they are able to support.
- If your project fits their criteria and one of their funding streams, the Foundation will invite you to make a formal application using their Grant Application Form.

### DEADLINES FOR APPLICATIONS

You can apply at any time throughout the year; applications will be considered on a quarterly basis in March, June, September and December. They will contact you with the outcome of your application once they have a decision from their trustees and donors. Decisions normally take between 1-2 months.

## THE DICKIE BIRD FOUNDATION

The Dickie Bird Foundation was launched in March 2004, with the aim of helping disadvantaged young people to participate in sport. A big misconception is that the Foundation only offers grants for cricket; it considers grants from all recognised sports.

The vision of the Foundation is to assist young people under 18 years of age to participate, to the best of their ability, in the sport of their choice, irrespective of their social circumstances, culture or ethnicity and to ensure that, in doing so, they improve their chances both inside and outside sport.

**STOP PRESS:** At the time of this booklet publication, The Dickie Bird Foundation is currently reviewing its programme with an update due to be published on their website during 2013. The information here relates to the current situation.

### PRINCIPAL CRITERIA

- The Foundation do not accept applications from schools, groups or associations – only from individual children under 18 years of age at the time the application is received by the Foundation.
- An application will only be considered for a grant if the applicant is unable to raise the necessary finance required as a result of impoverished circumstances.
- Applicants will need to show that their circumstances are such that they are unable to raise the finance necessary through any other means.
- Grants are to help with the cost of clothing and equipment to enable the individual to take part or continue in their chosen sport

### DEADLINE FOR APPLICATIONS:

Applications will be accepted at any time, though must be made on the Foundation's application form which is available from the website. Applicants can always ask for advice before or when completing the form. Check the dates of the Trustee meetings and ensure your application is with the Foundation fifteen working days prior to the meeting date of your choice. The Trustees meet every two months.

## HOUSING ASSOCIATIONS

There are numerous Housing Associations that operate across the Cheshire sub-region, all of which are working in partnership with their local communities to enhance the quality of life. Most have small grant schemes for projects affecting where their respective residents live; these small grants often have broad criteria and are usually in the region of £500.

## NATWEST CRICKETFORCE

CricketForce is an England and Wales Cricket Board volunteering initiative aimed at rejuvenating the nation's cricketing facilities. The initiative encourages cricket supporters, their friends and families to give something back to their local community cricket club by volunteering to undertake renovations to clubhouses and grounds. CricketForce aims to raise the profile of your club in the local community, help you recruit volunteers and to have a little fun along the way. It usually takes place in March / April each year; clubs should register their intent to participate annually via the website.

Occasionally, there are other opportunities that run along CricketForce. For example, in 2013, all CricketForce registered clubs could benefit from a £400 privilege account scheme offered by Jewsons.

## B&Q WASTE DONATION SCHEME

## **CASH 4 CLUBS**

Sports clubs that are registered with their sport's National Governing Body or local authority can apply for grants of up to £1,000 through the Cash 4 Clubs grants scheme.

### **PRINCIPAL CRITERIA**

- Cash 4 Clubs is a sports funding scheme which gives clubs a unique chance to apply for grants to improve facilities, purchase new equipment, gain coaching qualifications, and generally invest in the sustainability of their club.

### **OTHER CONSIDERATIONS**

- There are three tiers of grants at £250, £500 and £1,000; the website gives ideas as to what they will fund
- No preference is given to types of sport or the age of people involved with the club, but they do look for sports clubs that play an active role in the community.
- Broadly, around £30,000 is given out in grants each year, so bear this chance of success in mind if deciding to apply.

### **DEADLINES FOR APPLICATIONS**

Applications can be submitted at any time though grants are awarded twice a year.

Such organisations may produce funding bulletins that your Club could subscribe to; these may be free or offered at a nominal charge.
